


The Perfect Travel Games

A third way to practice colors is with streetlights and signs – just have the child name the color of the sign, or make a game out of finding the most red stop signs or most yellow signs.

Another fun version of the map game is to draw your own map. This is especially useful for younger children who can't read a regular map. Draw a happy home for where you are starting from and draw all the major places you plan on stopping. Connect all of them with a squiggly line. You could even number them if you want and help your child practice their numbers. At the end, draw a big smiley face where your final stop is. Make sure to include landmarks that your child will understand, like a mountain or bridge. Whenever you pass something that is on the map, let your child mark it – put an X through it, circle it, whatever they would like to do. This will let them know how much farther they still have to go but gives them a bit of fun since they better understand the trip. You can ask them how far you still have to go and let them help you by telling you that there are three more bridges for example.

There is lots of fun to be had with maps. Maps come in all shapes and sizes and there are as many opportunities to teach your children using maps as there are types of maps. If you're traveling across country, give your child a map of each state so they have it later to remember the trip by. Maps make wonderful memories, and your child will love playing navigator.
